PASTOR'S THOUGHTS:

Thanksgiving is around the corner, and time to “count our blessings.” Either we believe we have been “blessed” with family, friends, health, community, even prosperity – and give thanks for the gifts we have received, or we struggle to feel blessed because of some real or imagined hardship. The dictionary defines blessing as “a favor or gift bestowed by God, thereby bringing happiness.” We tend to equate happiness with blessings; and if we are not happy, we must not be blessed.

As people of faith, we are to give thanks in all things. But what has God given us in this year of earthly turmoil? Are our blessings dependent on the happenings of each day? And what about the orphan or the widow so often referred to in scripture? Does God bless some and not others? There are the nagging questions of blessings relative to whom... How does my happiness relate/compare/translate/affect the happiness of others? God's plan of love should be sufficient for everyone. But do we feel that, believe that?

In his book, *Velvet Elvis: Repainting the Christian Church*, Rob Bell writes:

“For Jesus everything is upside down. The best and greatest and most important are the ones who humble themselves, set their needs and desires apart and selflessly serve others. So what is a group of people living this way called? That’s the CHURCH. It is not ultimately about the church; it’s about the people God wants to bless through the church. When the church loses sight of this, it loses its heart. We reclaim the church as a blessing machine not only because that is what Jesus intended from the beginning, but also because serving people is the only way their perceptions of church are ever going to change.”


When serving others grace appears, and grace is the cornerstone of our blessings. We discover what the people we serve have to offer us. We see the goodness of a

Serving one another, blesses us, fills our emptiness, heals our hurts, and connects us to each other. So, in this season of thanksgiving, we are called to go beyond simply counting our blessings. Give thanks for God’s grace, and be a blessing!

THE ESCAPE BOOK CLUB





THE SHARON SPOTLIGHT



This month's Sharon Spotlight features an interview with our oldest member, Ellie Ball. Gracious and bright are two words which come to mind in describing Miss Ellie, who lives with her daughter and son-in-law, Barbara and Bob Gadkowski in Poplar Branch. A "little bird" had told Pastor Susan of Miss Ellie's love for chocolate shakes from the Sonic, so armed with a 4-pack Sonic drink carrier of shakes, Barbara, Bob, Miss Ellie and Pastor Susan had a delightful 103rd birthday visit. In between shake sips, Ellie was glad to answer questions Pastor Susan had prepared for the Spotlight.

This lifelong Methodist and granddaughter of a Methodist pastor was born in Brooklyn, NY, but grew up in Pittsburgh, PA. When asked what she recalls about growing up in Pittsburgh, she remembered carefree childhood days passing the time playing jump rope (her favorite) in a smoky steel mill town. Of course, this goes back to the days when Pittsburgh was a major steel manufacturing city with billowing smoke stacks. A scholarship offered through The Methodist Church where her mother was employed, along with odd jobs Ellie worked, allowed her to attend the University of Pittsburgh where she studied to be a teacher.

Miss Ellie talked much about the pivotal events in her life such as The Great Depression and World War II. She recalled the way neighbors helped neighbors during the Depression, how one had to be creative to make things stretch, and though meals were often repetitive and meager, she was grateful she never remembered feeling hungry. Her husband served as a Captain in the Army Air Corps in France and recalled how the celebration of Victory in Europe Day was a mixture of profound relief and joy for the homecoming of loved ones after years of being away, and the tears in remembering those who had given their all for the cause of freedom.

She attributes her love for reading to opening up a view and understanding of the world she would never have acquired otherwise and her talent with a paint brush could be marked as similar to impressionistic art. And one thing is for sure, Miss Ellie's humble spirit and winning smile always leaves you feeling better than when you arrived.

So, what advice does Ellie Ball offer those of us of the younger generation? "Love your neighbor as yourself," she says. "Don't worry about material things and hold close to your trust in God in all things." Truly words to live by!!

MONTHLY FOOD PANTRY “FILL A BAG DAY”
